One year after the war: Life in Gaza is more difficult than ever before

Thanks to your support Ahli Arab Hospital provides a lifeline to its neediest neighbors

One year after the war in Gaza, healthcare is on the verge of collapse. Every day Ahli Arab Hospital struggles with shortages of essential medicines, medical supplies, power outages, and a shortage of intensive care beds.

Suhaila Tarazi, Ahli's general director, offers heartrending examples of the difficulties her staff face as they work to serve their patients. "The number of critically ill patients has increased while the means to treat them are scarce. Hundreds of poor children who need ENT or orthopedic surgeries have been on a waiting list for more than a year. Many children below five years of age are suffering from malnutrition and their parents are waiting to enroll them in Ahli's underweight treatment program. Thousands of traumatized children and chronically ill elders are sadly forgotten."



When shelters closed, families whose homes were destroyed crowded in with extended family or created makeshift camps amid the rubble.

Conditions in Gaza are made worse by the constant threat of escalating violence and fear that another war will erupt between Israel and Hamas. Gaza is vulnerable to the disruption caused by the war in Ukraine, which has rapidly reduced the availability of food and other commodities in Gaza. Eighty percent of the population is dependent on aide for food.

Amidst all the fear and uncertainty faced by Gazans, Ahli Arab Hospital perseveres, offering compassionate care and expert medical services to more than 40,000 children and adults each year.

Suhaila expresses her gratitude for the support shown by American

friends, "We are grateful to all our partners in the Ahli mission of love and reconciliation. We are proud that we are able to make a difference in thousands of lives. Last year AFEDJ transferred \$2,134,059 to more than a dozen institutions in the Diocese of Jerusalem.

Grants support transformational projects in Jerusalem and Zarqa, Jordan

Donations from generous individuals and foundation funders allow schools and hospitals across the Diocese of Jerusalem to expand their offerings and extend the Christian values embodied by their institutions to those most in need.

When the Jerusalem Princess Basma Center's (JPBC) aging community outreach van died last year, things looked grim to the leaders at JPBC. But thanks to a generous donor, a new, fully-equipped van will soon hit the road to serve children with disabilities across the West Bank.

During outreach visits, children with disabilities are diagnosed and referred to the Center in Jerusalem for comprehensive and specialized rehabilitation programs which the local clinics are not equipped to provide.

In February, we shared the news with our partners in Jerusalem that a generous \$150,000 grant from Donald Campbell of Virginia would fund the purchase, modification, and equipping of a Volkswagen Transporter van.

Once back on the road with a new van and equipment, the outreach team will provide diagnoses for close to 100 children per month. These evaluations conducted in local communities are the first step in providing therapy and rehabilitation to many Palestinian children with disabilities.

Ayman Tmaizy, the director of a partner clinic near Hebron, explained the importance of its relationship with JPBC in providing direct services to families and training local staff, "We complete each other. With so many challenges, we cannot stand alone."

In early 2021 JPBC received a grant from UNICEF Norway to purchase state-of-theart audiology equipment and create the first advanced Audiology Unit in Palestine. However, they needed funding to recruit, train, and certify professional audiologists and build a referral network among the many community-based organizations, hospitals, and physician practices they work with across the West Bank.

The Dorothea Haus Ross Foundation awarded AFEDJ a grant on Princess

Basma Center's behalf that will allow JPBC to hire six audiologists and provide them with training to obtain certification in advanced audiology. The Auditory Unit initially will offer evaluation and auditory services to 80 students at JPBC's Inclusive School and 250 children referred from across the West Bank and Jerusalem.

JPBC isn't the only diocesan institution to benefit from foundation support. Saviour's School in Zarqa, a remarkable, vibrant learning community of 300 K-12 students led by Dua'a Bisharat, recently received a generous grant from the Sally and Dick Roberts Coyote Foundation. The grant provided dozens of new laptops, tablets, cameras, and software to enhance teaching and learning at Saviour's School.

Zarqa, Jordan's second largest city and industrial hub, has been hit hard by the pandemic and economic hardship has threatened the wellbeing of vulnerable families. At present, more than 50% of families in Zarqa live in poverty—more than twice the national average. In recent surveys, 69% of respondents in Zarqa reported they had lost all their income.

Donations from generous individuals and foundation funders allow Dua'a and other leaders of schools and hospitals across the Diocese of Jerusalem to expand their offerings and extend the Christian values embodied by their institutions to those most in need. Christian and Muslim parents in Zarqa and across the region seek to send their children to diocesan schools, hospitals, and rehabilitations centers because they treat all people with respect and promote the dignity and worth of every person.
