Before the Session

Session 5 Background

The goal of *Bearing Witness* is to inform, inspire and empower participants to act. As you have encountered Christians and others who live in the Holy Land – learning first-hand of their struggles, challenges, and abiding hope in God's faithfulness – we suspect you will find that there is no turning back.

The Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem institutions bring Palestinians hope and help to empower them in all aspects of their lives. This session focuses on Arab citizens of Israel, who face many challenges and roadblocks to employment, education, housing, and economic opportunity. Despite this, there are efforts to promote peacemaking and reconciliation among those of different identities in Israel.

The Apostle Peter advised the earliest Christians to imitate Christ by doing good and remaining faithful to their core Christian convictions, even when that entailed suffering. Like the first Christians, the clergy and lay leaders of the Diocese of Jerusalem have committed themselves to building a new, unified community grounded in God's redeeming act in Christ. They are ordinary people doing extraordinary things in the land of Jesus. Our response to this sacrifice must be to embrace engagement with our brothers and sisters in the Holy Land as a way to deepen our own Christian journey.

This is the last *Bearing Witness* session. It's a good time to revisit the Episcopal Church General Convention resolutions that have been passed over the years, calling us to learn about the Holy Land. Take a few minutes to reflect on how the program has helped you realize these objectives. This session gives special attention to #6 and includes a brief, related discernment process.

Episcopal Church General Convention resolutions calling us to learn about and engage with the Christian community in the Holy Land (condensed):

- Walk where Jesus walked and gain greater biblical insights on Jesus' transformative ministries
- 2. Deepen our understanding of the significance of the Holy Land to the Abrahamic faiths
- 3. Raise awareness of the inspiring and powerful Christian witness demonstrated by the community of Palestinian Anglicans in the region
- 4. Gain insight into one of our world's most vexing struggles for peace and justice and build our capacity to draw informed and fair conclusions regarding present and future realities in the region
- Understand the conditions that necessitate the humanitarian response of serving all who live in the region and strive for a life of security, dignity and freedom for all
- 6. Commit to concrete actions and advocacy that will sustain our engagement in a mission of helping to bring understanding, healing and reconciliation to the people in the Holy Land and to our own communities

OUR INVITATION

Jesus promises to be with us through the power of the Spirit, to work in and through us to accomplish his purposes in the world. This does not necessarily happen in easily visible, spectacular ways. Yet wherever there is healing, reconciling, life-giving work happening, this is the work of God. Wherever there is life in abundance, this is Jesus' presence in our midst. As disciples of Christ, we can help to bring hope and empowerment to all who live in the Holy Land through our support of the work and mission of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem and its institutions.

We are called to heal the brokenhearted with our voices, hands, and hearts. Just as the people we have heard from in *Bearing Witness*, we are called to bear witness to the building of God's kingdom near and far, including the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem.

- What transformative ministries is my church engaged with in my community, neighborhood, region, diocese, or the greater world?
- What parallels do I see between what the Diocese of Jerusalem does in schools, hospitals, training centers and my church's ministries of healing, teaching, or breaking barriers?

GROUP DISCERNMENT

This session culminates *Bearing Witness* and begins a process for individual and group discernment and action.

Discerning Next Steps for Me

- What has God continually focused my attention on during Bearing Witness?
- What question or concern have I returned to again and again? What might God be calling me to do and to be?
- What do I want to do differently because of what I've learned in Bearing Witness?

Discerning Next Steps for Our Group

- What has God continually focused our group's attention on during the Bearing Witness program?
- · What question or concern have we returned to again and again?
- Understanding we do not need to come to full consensus in this moment, what might God be calling us as a group to do and to be?
- As a group, what do we want to initiate, do differently, or continue to do?

Discerning Next Steps for My Congregation

- What question or concern for/about our congregation or ministry have we returned to again and again during the Bearing Witness program?
- What is God calling us as a congregation to do and to be?
- What do we want to help our congregation to do or see differently because of what we've learned in *Bearing Witness*?

CLOSING PRAYER

Merciful and loving God, we give you thanks for the many blessings you have so graciously given us. Thank you for your presence and guidance as we walk the way of peace.
